## <u>Nov. 22</u>:

### Security Tower at Main Gate

A few folks have inquired about the new security tower at the main entrance gate. The substation by the main gate is one of several security measures that are being undertaken due to November's break-in and theft at Candelaria Nature Preserve. These unfortunate events have made it a necessity for at least the present time. This most recent occurrence is in addition to several other break-ins we've dealt with this year at the Preserve.

## Field 4A

Grading and skidsteer work has been completed in Field 4A, and wood chips are staged in the East section of the field for easy access. Cottonwood Gulch will be back on-site tomorrow for a few hours to help move some of those wood chips around and engage in other stewardship and educational activities. Rio Grande Return employed a seed drill earlier this week to plant some on-hand native grasses in anticipation of the rain we're currently receiving.

# Field 4A

Rio Grande Return seeded all of 4A with some leftover seed mix last week. The seed mix consisted of dry soil grassland plants, some of which are cold season. Others in the mix have hard seed coats that will benefit from wet winter conditions, helpful for spring growth. The seed was raked in with the seed drill after hand broadcasting, and Rio Grande Return was able to seed all of 4A using these methods.

### Monday and Friday volunteer events

Monday and Friday volunteer events are still in full swing! <u>Monday volunteer events will be held</u> <u>from 8-11am</u>, and <u>Friday volunteer events will take place from 10-noon</u>. Adjustments may happen based on weather conditions, so please stay tuned for future updates. We have been fortunate to have such dedicated volunteers, so we encourage you to join us at your convenience during these days, even if you can't stick around for the entire time.

## Dec. 15

Last week, <u>RiverXchange</u> students were on site at Candelaria Nature Preserve, where they planted over 120 plants in Field 4A. This Friday, volunteers were back on site removing Johnson grass. No wildlife photos to share this week - CABQ Open Space and Rio Grande Return staff are working on replacing faulty cameras.

Orlando recently completed the <u>Winter Report</u> for FY23 - big thank you to all who helped contribute information, and props to Orlando for stepping up to the plate.

On the ground, coyote activity was reported in Field 4B, and a bald eagle (!) was spotted during the bird survey last week, courtesy of Jo and company's wonderful data collection efforts across the CNP.
